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


Hello Members,





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
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Silent Auction Success! March 21st, 2015 Article by Cecelia Wheeler

From Celebration, Florida to a Celebration of American Iron

As usual, our expert Rally Master Jay Hixson planned yet another exceptional road trip. Sunday morning, following our successful Concours d'Elegance in Celebration, he offered those of us willing to get up early and scarf down breakfast a back roads drive to Ocala to visit an exceptional private American car collection. Early that morning, Jay stood patiently in front of the Melia Suites Hotel waiting for fourteen pre-registered drivers and their navigators to arrive for briefing about our adventure. Because the drive entailed multiple roads, each of us received a detailed map package that would have made Marco Polo proud. The difficulty with this masterful array of instructions was that we had to convince our navigators that the maps were easy to read and that the written instructions were clear and concise. No small feat for many of us.

Promptly at 9 a.m., thirteen beautiful Jaguars plus Danny and Dianna Bogdany's classic 1964 Ford Thunderbird accelerated out of the Melia Hotel parking lot trying to stay close to Jay's XK8 convertible. Within a few miles, our small Jaguar 'peloton' had spread out over a mile or two and our 'Beetlebaum' driver had a hard time staying connected. Our Rally Master had promised us there would be stretches of road where we could really drive our cars the way they were meant to be driven. Sure enough, before long we were on a stretch of deserted country road

cruising close to Mach 1. (For you non-aviators, that's the speed of sound). My navigator kept reminding me that I couldn't afford another traffic ticket and tried to push her feet through the floorboard every time I had to make a sudden stop. Needless to say, she was worried for our safety and a possible unforgiving cop for most of the trip

About half way through the drive we made our first stop at the Likity Split Cafe, a typical old Florida wayside road stop that served great home-made ice cream and fast-food cuisine. Like vultures on road kill, we all descended on the ice cream counter to get a couple of scoops of their famous frozen fare. Of course the name of

the establishment invited numerous funny and raunchy comments by many of the 'gentlemen' drivers. What else would you expect from a bunch of dedicated CatDrivers?

After a brief twenty minute rest, the Rally Master called us out for the final leg of our drive which would take us through some of Central Florida's most beautiful country. Clermont, Groveland, Bushnell and a number of small towns gave us a taste of what old Florida looked like many years ago and provided a stark contrast to the modern metropolitan areas of Orlando, Jacksonville, Miami, Tampa and even the Villages.

At twenty minutes 'til noon, we arrived at the Burger King restaurant on Silver Springs Blvd. near I-75 in Ocala. Most of us were hungry enough to have a nice meal at a good local restaurant since breakfast had been four hours earlier. But, because our stopping time was so short, most of us settled for an order of fast food. At precisely 12 o'clock, we drove the last 500 yards of our three-hour journey into the parking lot of the National Parts Depot (NPD)





After getting our tired bodies out of the cars, we saw a massive building about the size of a Super Walmart. Once inside, we checked out a long glass counter which was filled with all kinds of car parts for older Mustangs, Fords, Chevelles, Pontiac GTO's and a few other American cars. Many of these parts were specially designed to dress up cars as well as provide mechanical parts to help restore a 'project'. After wandering around the sales area for a few minutes, we were greeted by Rick Schmidt who is the son of the founder and owner of NPD.







Rick gave a quick overview of what the business does, who their customers are and where their other three depots are located around the country. He also explained how he and his father got into car collecting which started as a hobby but soon turned into a passion. Rick explained that they now own 202 cars of

various brands and condition. One of their Pontiac Firebirds once belonged to "Bandit" Burt Reynolds. Another had never even been licensed. Others have had ground-up restoration and still others were left in the condition they were in when they were purchased. No matter which car had a question by one of us, Rick had all the details and stories about it at his fingertips. He also told us they send some of their cars for restoration to well-respected restoration shops in the U.S., plus do a little bit of restoration at their Ocala facility. Basically, neither Rick nor his father had a specific plan of what type vehicle they acquired; they simply bought or traded for cars they liked. When asked if he had ever had a Woody, Rick explained that they're just too difficult to maintain and restore.

Following the short introduction, we were escorted to the rear of the building which housed the full collection. The display room is much larger than a football field, is fully air- conditioned and has lots of overhead lighting. About 160 cars were neatly parked in four rows but in no particular order. The first car one sees when entering the room is a restored Model-T, followed by a few classic 1920's, 1930's and 1940's Fords, Buicks, Packards and Chryslers. Numerous Lincoln Continentals were among the Schmidts' favorites. Most of the cars seemed to have no specific order with various brands and models mixed together. After 45 minutes in the first room, we followed Rick back to a second room which contained the remaining 40 vehicles. The actual tour lasted about 90 minutes but a few of us would have liked to have spent lots more time looking. The cars took up less than half the building; the rest was filled with their business inventory.









CatDrivers may not want to drive old or new American iron', but this tour gave us a new appreciation of what our domestic car manufactures had created. Those early cars had 'style, class and bling' with many innovations that are now standard on all cars.

Thanks again to Rick Schmidt, NPD and Rally Master Jay Hixson for putting together another exciting event for the club.









Cars & Coffee at Amelia Island 2015

Oh What A Beautiful Mornin'!!! One could almost hear that song being sung as our frost blue XK coupe was carefully ushered onto the first green of the golf course at the Ritz Carlton at Amelia Island. It was Saturday, March 14, 8:00 am and ours was among 267 exquisite cars chosen to display. Approximately 20 were Jaguars and most were owned by members of JCOF and JCCNF. We were grouped together

right next to the Jaguar USA Pavilion where priceless vehicles, several which had previously been driven to victories by Sir Stirling Moss, were displayed. Saturday featured a bronze colored 1952 XK-SE coupe which had set nine new international and world records with four drivers covering 16,851 miles in 168 hours. That's an average speed of 100.32 mph for seven days and nights. AND that was in 1952! At the Concours d'Elegance on Sunday, one of only 54 D-Types manufactured for private use was displayed. It

had been at auction previously and supposedly sold for \$3.5M. Read about

Jaguar USA sponsored a Ride & Drive and people lined up for sometimes over an hour to drive the new F-Type coupe or convertible, XF or XJ sedans.
