



BOOK REVIEW

When I first flipped through this beautiful new book, my reaction was summed up in just two words: **Awe Some!** However, I soon found the claim "Every Model Since 1935" to be a bit misleading. I had just edited Ian Crawford's article about two Jaguar XJ 220s but could not find 220s among "Every Model" in this book. Ditto for C-Type, D-Type and other supercars. Oh well, since only 271 XJ220s were built, and even fewer Cs and Ds, FerGetAboutIt!

I also noted that the very capable author, Nigel Thorley, often referenced calendar years instead of model years. For example, I own a 2011 (model year) XK Coupe that does not have changes -described by Mr.Thorley as '2011' on pages 202-203-which were not made until the 2012 model year. I'm not sure if that's a consistent quirk but it should be noted for JCNA Concours judges and apprentices who might use this book for authoritative reference (which I highly recommend).

Only two months earlier, Norma and I had traveled 654 miles to Little Switzerland, NC to participate in the Carolina Jaguar Club's annual Concours d'Elegance. After that long

The Show and Display rule had just been enacted and special interest cars could be imported to the USA with some restrictions. Grange Jaguar in London had two for sale, silver and red. After studying detailed photos I decided on the Monza Red with the tan interior. I bought it sight unseen. First mistake!

Although the photos were accurate, it had been smoked in and had to undergo a course in ozone exposure to remove the smell. I did negotiate an engine-out service at Jaguar's XJ220 specialists, a man and a boy team. As Robert Burns, the famous Scottish poet said, "The best laid plans o' mice an' men gang aft agley" [often go awry]. (Equivalent to Murphy's Law).

As my car arrived for service, the mechanic's wife gave birth. Nine months later my car set sail for the USA and I am still trying to work out the coincidences. In fairness to Jaguar, part of that delay was the DOT/NHTSA delays in issuing the paperwork.

The Show and Display rules required that the car be brought up to EPA standards, so I chose a registered tester in New Jersey. I quote: "This will not be a hard project 30-45 days." Nine months later, they certified the Jag, but no-one was pregnant in this case.

My Jag was the virgin bride of their first attempt! I later learned that they eventually used a surrogate that had certified one before. Basically they had to fiddle with Zytek computer program and use high yield catalytic converter entrails. By this time I had moved on with my life, until one day a moving truck pulled up at the gate and a petite driver wriggled through the small driver's window to unload my XJ220. Images of the typical overweight truck driver wriggling through the window flashed through my mind again and again, but I realized I was due a well-deserved break.

The year was 2001 and I had owned the XJ220 for 18 months *in absentia and sight unseen.* A good decision made was to register the car in the UK just in case it returns one day, duty free. I am not sure my wife's sister realizes what a handsome ghost sleeps in her Devon garage.

First impressions as I approached were of the wide rear tires and large Venturi tunnels. Jaguar was technically way ahead of its time. Even the turbocharged V6 engines for power and lightness are now in vogue – see the new Ford GT.

Generally, the car has been very reliable; the biggest problem is a lack of regular use. It needs to be run every 3 or 4 weeks to lubricate the gaskets and prevent the injectors from gumming up. I would say that the cam cover gasket is the biggest issue, as an oil leak drips onto the exhaust and turbo with smoky results. Plan on changing these gaskets every 5 or six years. But I digress.

Tracking the prices of these Jags, the initial euphoria of the Show and Display law died down and prices retreated. Like any good investor, or perhaps gambler, I doubled down. A Spa Silver XJ220 investment was stored in Germany for eight years but eventually acquired by the bank. I guess the owner did not make other good investments.

After a protracted negotiation by Oakfields and their German agents, the silver auto was delivered to Don Law Racing to reawaken the sleeping beauty.

The main issue was stuck injectors, but after an engine-out belt and fluid service, the car was running like a gem. Interestingly, after establishing that the fuel bag was of the Teflon-coated type, Don did not believe it needed changed after 8 years. It lasted until the recent service in 2017, but I do not recommend waiting that long due to the risk of the internal foam decaying. This car is now a multinational, registered in Germany, UK and USA. I am absolutely certain that my British sister-in-law does not realize that she has two supercars in her garage.

Getting smarter this time, I made a good choice of EPA Certifier, JK Technologies. The work was done in 9 days at half the cost. I did live with a CEL light, but the car ran great. The CEL light turned out to warn of a kinked hose to the carbon fuel emissions canister.

So now I have two Xj220s: A red "driver" with 3,500 km [2,175 miles] and a silver "trailer queen" with 450 km [280 miles]. That is not really a good justification, so I just repeated my accountant's predictions of \$1M to my wife. For many years the prices languished but finally we are nearly at 50% of my accountant's goal.

The real reason for owning these cars is to see the look of amazement on gawkers' faces when they are told that the cars were conceived in 1986, made in 1993 and were the fastest roadworty cars in the world throughout the 1990s.

I have put about 7000 km [4350 miles] on the Monza Red car driving to shows as far away as Sarasota. It is at its best on the highway where the lack of rear vision and poor turning circle is transcended by the awesome high speed performance and relative ride comfort. The car is heavy around town with no power steering or servo-ed brakes, but at high speed it lightens up and enters its sweet spot.

The fuel economy is surprisingly good, 25 MPG, due to the relatively small displacement engine of 3.5 liters; light weight due to the extensive use of aluminum; and good aerodynamics. Of course if one spools the turbos that figure will drop rapidly. It cracks me up to note that the boost gauge is door-mounted in a neat nacelle. If you are looking at that gauge registering while driving, your survival is in imminent jeopardy.

Over the next 15 years I found a few things to watch out for. The center lock wheels need to be checked occasionally. I invested in a steel center lug adaptor with a 1-inch breaker bar, leaving the fancy aluminum one in the boot. After an unconscious period of driving with one wheel slightly loose, the wheel and nut were replaced due to wear. The good part is that Don Law Racing carries virtually all the parts including glass at prices I do not consider to be overly exorbitant, considering the rarity of these cars, Don also offers upgrades, so I did invest in a stage 1 brake job on the Spa silver and a stage 3 on the Monza Red.

The original ceramic brake pads were designed for track use and need to be warmed up to work. This is not an ideal situation for puttering around town. The stage 1 is a pad change to more normal material and that made a big difference. Stage 3 uses updated pads, rotors and a servo, for a lighter touch and racing use.

In the last year, both Bridgestone and Pirelli have finally brought out replacement tires. Check YouTube for a great Don Law/Bridgestone video about the development and testing using the original but somewhat matured XJ220 test drivers. *There is nothing more exciting than driving a 217 MPH car on 25 year old tires!*

There was no rot, but the rubber was getting hard. New Bridgestone tires and even a set of gold BBS wheels were procured.

The main XJ220 Resource is <u>Don Law Racing</u>. Recently, Jaguar/Land Rover became more interested in their heritage and set up a new Jaguar Classic operation, including XJ220 service.

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PEBBLE BEACH CONCOURS D'ELEGANCE

The Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance is planned years ahead. It takes place at the 18th hole at the Pebble Beach Golf Club, a truly magnificent setting. It is probably the premier Concours in the United States, perhaps the world.

There were around 24 countries represented, including this year's Best of Show winner from Hong Kong.

The organizational skills required to pull off one of these megaevents is awesome. Parking for the many thousands of visitors was challenging but generally handled with great precision.

When you first walk in, you get to see the "concept" cars on display. Some, like a new Lincoln Continental with the old "suicide" type rear doors, are supposed to make it to a very



limited production. Others are just the stuff of dreams. Most were electric but with beyond enormous power. Lotus was simple but really elegant and Genie's favorite. Lexus had a "pixeled-look" paint job that reflected the surrounding grass making it a little camouflaged.



These large Concours events usually target some specific brands for any given year. Once we entered the Concours area it became obvious that there were a large number of Bugattis and Bentleys. There were the usual pre-war Mercedes, Packards, Cadillacs, Rolls-Royces, Dusenbergs, Ferraris and a number of very old and rare brands including a 1909 Thomas Flyer.



Later in our vacation, Genie and I went up to Reno and visited the Harrah's car museum. We had the opportunity to see the "REAL" or "ACTUAL" 1907 Thomas Flyer that won the New York to Paris race driving about 22,500 miles.



I can only describe it as an incredible race, certainly not for the faint of heart. Imagine driving the western USA in winter. Then across Japan and across Russia from Vladivostok through Moscow, to Paris at a time when there were no roads. They used a lot of railroad tracks.

A sad point at the Pebble Beach Concours happened when we looked and could not find any Jaguars. We asked and were told that out of about 220 entrants, there were no Jaguars!

The vast majority of cars were pre-war with a few post-war going into the early to mid-sixties. Most of these were cars like Alfa Romeo, Ferrari, Talbot-Lago, Lancia, and (5) 1967-68 Lamborghini Miura, a very beautiful 1960 Aston Martin DB4, and a 1962 DB4GT Zagato Coupe which was chosen as one of the Best in Show Nominees.



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Still, it was obvious that the emphasis of the Concours for this year were the large pre-war 12 and 16 cylinder American and European cars. There were quite a few very old and very beautiful samples of Bentleys. Each was restored to such perfection that it would be next to impossible to find fault in any of them. I am sure most of them never looked that good when they left the factory.



I am told that the primary tool in decision making that the judges use to decide "Best in Show" is "Presence". Does the car have Presence? Well, all these cars have lots of presence. I think that is one of the reasons why small cars like a Ferrari or a Jaguar seldom win a "Best in Show".



I spent some time speaking with a gentleman from the UK who had brought a 1934 Aston Martin Mark II Sports Saloon. He told me that the car had been restored in the UK at the Aston Martin factory for 2 years where they took it all apart and manufactured any part missing or in need of replacement. I can only guess at the small fortune spent in doing this restoration. The car was airfreighted into Carmel and would be airfreighted back to the UK the day after the Concours. I was saddened that the car did not win anything in the Concours. Such is the quality and caliber of competition. When you put a no matter how well restored Ferrari next to a Dusenberg or a 16-Cylinder 1931 Cadillac Fleetwood Phaeton, or a 1936 Mercedes-Benz 540K or the BEST IN SHOW winner, and you then apply the concept of "Presence," it is much easier to understand why the small cars seldom win, even though the Ferrari might fetch 17 million dollars at auction and the big cars only 2-3 million.

We had a chance to see and meet Jay Leno who was walking to the podium and posing for lots of selfies with people who approached him. He really is a gem. To his credit he had an auction and raised \$126,000 for a local Boys/Girls Club he supports. It was noted that in just a few years Jay Leno has raised over \$800,000.00 for the charity.
