

Jaguar XKs "Featured Marque" at Hilton Head Island Concours d'Elegance

Our trip to Hilton Head Island in South Carolina for their 2019 Concours d'Elegance was a bit different from our last time there in 2016. This year we were accompanied by our good friends, Tom and Liza Wright. Earlier this year Tom had advised me that the Hilton Head Concours committee was planning to feature XK Jaguars and that we had both been invited! We submitted the necessary paperwork and pictures then arranged for Alfredo, the gentleman who usually transports my two cars, to transport both Wrights' and our Jaguars to Hil-

ton Head Island (HHI). Our schedule required that Alfredo pick up the cars in the morning, deliver them on Halloween night, then stay and not return home until Sunday, November 3rd.

On the evening of October 31, we met most of the other Jaguar exhibitors for dinner at the Red Fish Restaurant.

Dinner was arranged by Mr. Bill Schmitt, HHI Concours co-chairman, as well as other concours participants from the local area. RM Sotheby's, Mr. Ramsey Potts was Master of Ceremonies. [If

you've met Ramsey, you'll know he did not need a microphone]. This was a great evening for meeting fellow Jaguar owners and enthusiasts.

On Friday morning, we took our cars out of the trailer and proceeded to join many other exhibitors with all sorts of vehicle brands on the *Tour d'Elegance*. When we arrived on Thursday, the temperature at HHI was in the mid-seventies. By Friday morning it had dropped to the low to mid-forties. Any thought of wearing shorts or putting the Hood down on the convertible during the *Tour* went out the window. Jackets and heaters seemed much more appropriate under a clear and beautiful sky.

The *Tour d'Elegance* took us through the city of Bluffton, South Carolina and its historical center. The Bluffton police department gave all of us in the Tour a motorcycle escort to ensure that our rather large group would remain together. Other vehicles would not be allowed to interfere.

On Saturday, HHI held the *Cars Club Showcase*. Genie and I attended and took our transport driver, Alfredo, for a short trip as he was certainly getting bored. I was surprised to find out that HHI awarded prizes in a manner similar to their Concours d'Elegance. In fact, some of the cars displayed at the *Cars Club Showcase* would appear again at Sunday's Concours.

Sunday was again a cold morning but a very pretty blue-sky day. We were directed to park in the "Honored Marque" area reserved for 17 "by invitation" XK Jaguars. A spectacular red 1953 C-Type Jaguar highlighted the Marque, then there was an early XK120 with an aluminum alloy body. Several regular steel bodied XK120s XK140s, XK150s, plus five XK150 'S' models --including our Open Two Seater (OTS) and Tom and Liza Wright's Fixed Head Coupe (FHC) were displayed.

Our Cotswold Blue OTS was judged against only one other 'S', a beautiful dark blue with a black hood, owned by Roy and Linda Cleveland. I noticed the hood [convertible top] was quite beautiful and perfect (like mine). I asked Roy (a very nice man), where he had the top done and I understood him to say Muncie Imports or OSJI --the same trim shop that restored ours. In the end, the judges decided



that there can only be one winner, and Roy and Linda were awarded top honors. Genie and I were honored to earn second place.

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The lead judge in our class later told Genie that both cars were "perfect," but they based their decision with belief that the other OTS' engine ran smoother. When they asked me to start the car, the engine was cold, and the electric choke kicked in as it is supposed to. That makes the engine run at a higher RPM until it warms up (usually just a couple of minutes). The lesson I learned from this experience is to make sure to warm up the engine before the judges arrive next time.

I should note that this year's HHI Motoring Festival was celebrating women's pioneering automotive accomplishments. In an article by Bill Schmitt, he points to their charity, *Driving Young America*, for awarding funds and scholarships. We had a group of young girls go through a full operational check of each car. The idea was to train these young Girl Scouts to pursue careers in automotive related fields. These checks were performed before the actual judges arrived and were simply for training. Of interest: *No Engine Checks*!

Genie and I were pleased to see several JCOF friends at HHI. JAGWire editor, Robert Delmar was there with his camera, of course, and he posted many <u>FUN PHOTOS</u> on the 'netfrom this and recent years at HHI. Check out the "Packard in the Pond" at HHI in 2016.

Attending this Concours and the many activities is always a very interesting experience. It is a chance to see so many cars, not only Jaguars but just about every brand you can think of. I really encourage everyone to attend next year. Visit www.HHIconcourscom for full information.

Editor's Note: John and Lynette Sutton delighted JCOF members when they joined JCOF then showed their gorgeous <u>Suffolk 1936</u> <u>SS 100 'RepliJAG'</u> at our 2016 Concours d'Elegance at Celebration, Fl. Suffolk Sportscars Ltd. reported that they had built over 315 examples of their Suffolk SS100, therefore outproducing the original SS100s production run of 314. We hope to see the Suttons and their gorgeous Jaquar at JCOF's 2021 Concours d'Elegance at Lake Mary on April 23.

Several years ago I was racing against Terry Rowing and he told me about a car he was building. It was a replica of a Jaguar SS100 from 1936, but it used all modern components from the post war Jaguar.

The specification was independent front suspension with disc brakes a 6 cylinder 4.2 litre XK engine with twin overhead camshafts mated to a Hobbs gearbox with an option for a 5 speed gearbox made in the USA. The rear suspension is independent with in-board disc brakes and a chassis mounted differential.

He was restoring an original SS100 for Adrian Newey, the guy who designed the Mercedes and Red Bull Formula 1 race cars, and asked him if he could take a mould from his body. Adrian agreed and so Terry took it to a high class ship builder in Lowestoft and they made a very good job of reproducing the body.

I had always wished to own one of these Suffolk Jaguars as they would allow me to travel anywhere without the need to have access to antique spares as all the components could be accessed from a Jaguar Dealer, plus they are far less expensive than an original car which would currently cost about \$500,000.

Terry was not particularly commercial and so the project was sold to Roger Williams who has subsequently made more than 300. There are 10 examples in the USA. All the components used to build these cars are also used when restoring an original SS100 and thus they are very accurate replicas.

I went to Woodbridge in Suffolk which is where the Bentwaters US Airforce base is located and met with Roger and we went on a test drive which is on YouTube, filmed by my friend Trevor Morgan

This was in 2013 and I ordered a Silver car with red upholstery. Shortly afterwards we decided to move to Florida and I decided that a Left Hand Drive car would be more suitable. On contacting Roger he told me that there was a suitable car available in Colorado and that the guy who had built it had recently died. We therefore arranged for me to purchase this car after fitting more suitable original style seats and an original luggage grid for the rear.

Before arriving in the USA, I purchased a very nice suitcase bound in white velum which could be strapped to the luggage grid for use on longer journeys and touring. It has a lift out section for smaller items above the main storage area.

The car was duly shipped to me in Kissimmee and the title changed. It is a superb car with lots of power, it will easily exceed 120 mph, and handles very well too. It has presently only done under 6000 miles and has won numerous awards.

I joined the Florida Jaguar Club and have made numerous good friends with Jaguar cars of different ages. I would recommend anyone with a suitable car to join as there are events organized during the year which are great fun.

Unfortunately I recently received a letter from Roger Williams to say that due to the COVID -19 epidemic the company has gone into liquidation, and so it looks as if there will be no more Suffolk Jaguars built.

Jaguar XJ220 – <u>The Tumultuous Birth of The</u> Sensational Supercar

For the most part of the 20th century, Jaguar had been a dominant force on the race tracks around the world, winning the <u>1951 and 1953 Le Mans</u> with the C-Type and 1955-1957 renditions of the race with the D-Type. But ever since the jinxed <u>XJ13</u>, the company was reluctant to put all its efforts into creating a spectacular road car. And then, the early 1990s saw the Jaguar XJ220, a futuristic teardrop-shaped two-seater and a not so subtle reminder that Jaguar has still got it.

This epiphanic moment gave birth to the most spectacular Jaguar in a long time and one of the company's most iconic creations. On the other hand, the story of the XJ220's genesis is also tumultuous and full of unexpected turns. <u>Click Here to read more about the iconic XJ220</u>.

Jaguar's renaissance under Tata Motors almost birthed a successor to the XJ220. It was the C-X75, a remarkable 2010 supercar concept which sadly never transcended beyond the show car stage despite the company's plans to put it in production. The global recession forced Jaguar Land Rover to pull the plug on it, leaving the XJ220 heirless for now.

Three decades later, Jaguar hasn't made a faster road car, nor any production car to even come near succeeding the XJ220. Despite its inherent flaws and unfulfilled promises, this fact, in particular, makes the XJ220 the greatest and by far the most memorable Jaguar of the modern era.

It's the same car Freddie Flintoff pushed to 200 mph in a recent episode of Top Gear.



During a recent episode of Top Gear, Chris Harris, Paddy McGuinness, and Freddie Flintoff drove a Ferrari F40, Lamborghini Diablo, and Jaguar XJ220, three of the most iconic supercars from the 1990s. But as McGuinness <u>found out the hard way</u>, these analog supercars are unforgiving as the slightest misjudgment can end in disaster. The host lost control of the Diablo on a damp road and crashed into a fence, causing extensive damage to the supercar.

Sadly, the Jaguar XJ200 featured in the film has now also been wrecked. Details about the accident are scarce, but it looks like the driver lost control on a country road and slammed into some trees, destroying the front fascia.

Unlike the <u>Jaguar F-Type</u>, the XJ220 doesn't have any modern driving assists like traction control and ABS, so it needs to be handled with care. We don't know how fast they were driving, but a witness on social media claims "the driver was luckily fine and talking but nearly killed all of us!"

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
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



